Minutes of Vestry Meeting

Sunday, February 18, 2018 12:00 p.m.

The meeting commenced at 12:03 p.m.

Attendance: Fr. Matthew McMillan, Dave Hunt, Sharon Hanns, Jonathan Wilkinson @ head table

1. **Opening Prayer** – Fr. Matthew McMillan

Fr. Matthew McMillan opened the meeting with prayer.

2. Selection of Vestry Clerk and Parish Tribunal

The Rector announced that Catherine Goodman was appointed as Vestry Clerk and that John Martin and Trevor Kimpton along with the Wardens and Rector of St. Mary's Richmond Hill made up the Parish Tribunal.

3. Approve Agenda and Signing Vestry Declaration

Fr. Matthew McMillan read the following Declaration:

"I solemnly declare that I have been a member of the Anglican Church of Canada and of this congregation for at least three (3) months, that I have regularly attended services of worship with this congregation at least three (3) times in the past year. I am of the full age of sixteen (16) years, and that I have not voted as a member of any other vestry during the previous three (3) months, nor do I intend to vote in any other vestry during the ensuing year.

The Rector then asked those parishioners who were eligible to sign in. (Record of attendance in office)

4. Review /Accept past year Vestry Minutes

The reading of the Minutes of Vestry of February 26, 2017 was dispensed with and that there being no changes required to the said Minutes that they be adopted and confirmed.

5. Present Parish Leadership Reports (Diocesan Bishop, Area Bishop, Rector and Wardens Reports)

"That the reading of the Parish Leadership reports and those of the Bishops, Parish Priest and Corporation members be dispensed with and that they be received as presented in the Vestry report".

Fr. Matthew expressed his thanks to those whose Ministry is reflected in the reports for their hard work and support. He also expressed his thanks to the retiring wardens, Dave Hunt and Jonathan Wiilkinson.

6. Review and Accept the Churchwardens 2017 Financial Report

Dave Hunt presented the Churchwardens' Financial Report for 2017. His budgeting approach/objective for 2017 is to:

- (1) Operate within resources and reserve for significant expenses while anticipating rate increases.
- (2) Provide for Clergy support/relief, maintain some targeted investment in key ministries and maintain parish ministry during interim ministry period.
- (3) The plan for the future is to pursue Family Ministries fundraising, capital expenditures and position for commencement of new ministry

Dave presented the key elements regarding the 2017 budget (revenues and expenses) which contributed to the surplus of \$1650. The key to this outcome was that envelope donations trailed budget from March – April (envelope donations were 83% of budget during interim ministry period) but donations increased from September forward (97% of budget, which included budgeted 5% increase) and December met 100% of budget along with rental income increases.

Staffing was below budget during interim ministry period and utilities below plan due to mild winter/cool Spring. All other expenses maintained control.

Dave stated that draft financial statements were submitted to the Auditor and that final issuance from Auditor is expected shortly. Dave thanked the parishioners for their support.

That the 2017 Draft Financial statements be accepted as presented.

7. Review and Approve proposed 2018 Parish Budget

Dave Hunt presented the proposed budget for 2018. The approach to this budget is to continue the objective of operating within resources and reserve for significant expenses and potential rate increases. The objective is to continue to budget for Clergy relief to support Priest and maintain some targeted investment in new/existing ministries. The plan is to continue eaves/roof work currently in progress (completion weather dependent).

In budgeting for revenues for 2018 it was assumed that envelope donations increase approximately 5% while other donations track to prior 2 year average patterns. It was also assumed that rental income maintains current tenants and negotiated rates are maintained and that fundraising events will support general revenues.

With respect to expenses, we should plan for a (1) precautionary 5% rate increase and that utilities be planned against a 'hard winter'/hot summer (2) maintain 2017 expense control and have and expense reserve including Rectory and CAPEX of \$11,000. There should be no significant change to administration but \$3000 should be set aside for investment in new/existing ministry initiatives and a continued investment in clergy relief of \$2840.

The proposed budget yielded a surplus of \$1245 inclusive of all investments mentioned above and expense reserves.

A brief explanation of the vulnerabilities to the budget while looking to the future was provided by Dave.

Revenues – donations less than budget and possible loss of a major tenant (40% of base)

Expenses – Utilities greater than baseline and unexpected CAPEX greater than budget of \$10,000 (2017)

Investment in Future – 2018 is a year of re-energizing for the future; continued stewardship of our financial and physical resources and act in faith and trust in God.

Eaves/roof fundraising and expenses - Remaining expense to be paid for this work is \$47,107 with an amount of \$7789 remaining from funds raised. To cover the remaining cost it may be necessary, if no further fundraising, to use funds pending transfer to Heritage fund from 2017 in the amount of \$14,342 and draw an estimated amount of \$24,976 from the Heritage fund.

That the proposed Wardens' budget for 2018 be approved.

Bishop's Pastoral Letter to Vestries, 2019

To our Clergy, Churchwardens and Parishioners

Beloved in Christ, peace and grace be with you.

This will be the first time, in almost 30 years, that I am not chairing a vestry meeting. I am one of those people who actually enjoys vestry; poring over audited financial statements, ministry reports, marking important milestones in the parish, celebrating the incredible contributions of our lay leaders (without whom very little would happen). Deeper than that, a good meeting names the anxiety we have in trying to balance the needs of the parish while trusting deeply in the hope that God will guide, provide and inspire us to deepen our faith, try new ideas and be creative in our endeavour to serve the mission of God. The vestry meeting is one moment in the year when a parish has the opportunity to look back and then to look forward. I am joined by the Area Bishops in assuring you of our prayers as you gather for your annual meeting. We also extend our deepest gratitude for all who have served so faithfully as wardens, committee members, teachers, greeters and leaders who make known the love of Christ through their offering of time, talent and treasure. If you are taking on a new role this year, a particular word of encouragement to you.

Over the last several years it has been our practice to invite each parish to consider a vestry motion that addresses issues of poverty and social action. In view of the drastically rising economic inequity in our province, this year's vestry motion asks your parish to consider Standing in Solidarity, by making a commitment to protect all who are living in poverty, through direct local and parish outreach and through meaningful advocacy.

On January 13th, 2019 I was formally seated as the 12th Bishop of Toronto. The journey to that moment has been heart-warming, moving and humbling. I am heartened by your words of encouragement, humbled by your support, and moved by your desire to row and to pedal! I will be forever indebted to Archbishop Colin for his encouragement and support. I am invigorated by the passion and faithfulness of our Area Bishops Peter, Riscylla, Kevin and Jenny as we step in together to write a new chapter as the College of Bishops. I

am impressed beyond words by the dedication of our staff in the Diocesan office, and by the creative ways that ministry is happening every day in our parishes and centers of ministry around the Diocese.

I am thrilled to be on the road Sunday by Sunday visiting parishes, celebrating worship and getting to know you. I am finding my bearings with each of the committees, councils and task forces of the Diocese. I will be spending time with the clergy in each Deanery to glean the wisdom of those who lead in each community. In the first week of May I would like to meet with the laity of the Diocese through 5 scheduled Town Hall meetings (details will be posted on the Diocesan website). Each gathering gives us time to listen to each other, articulate our hopes for ministry, and catch a glimpse of what might be. I hope that you will join me.

May God bless you as you meet for Vestry.

Bishop's Pastoral Letter to Vestries, 2019

My Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I greet you in the Name of our Loving, Liberating and lifegiving God, Creator, Redeemer and Sanctifier.

I offer my prayers and good wishes as you gather for your annual Vestry meetings. I thank all of you for your dedication and commitment to God's mission and your parish's participation in that mission.

We gathered in our Cathedral on Sunday January 13, 2019 for a wonderful celebration for the Installation of the 12th Bishop of Toronto, Andrew John Asbil. What a wonderful occasion and I ask that we pray for him, his wife Mary, and the clergy and people of our diocese as he begins his new ministry as our Chief-pastor.

We place on record our sincere thanks and gratitude for the long, devoted and faithful ministry of Archbishop Colin Johnson. His 42 years of ordained ministry provided strong and exemplary leadership in our diocese. We pray for God's richest blessings on him and Ellen in their years of retirement.

I encourage the support and passing of the Social Justice Vestry motion 2019: Standing in Solidarity. If we are to be true to our baptismal covenant, then all of us should feel compelled to do our part in support of those among us that are living in poverty. It is not good enough to simply pray for the poor but to be responsive to their needs and encourage others also to be. In the motion 'parishes are invited to pledge one way to increase their direct outreach on behalf of those in need and one way to increase their advocacy efforts toward structural and policy changes to benefit people experiencing poverty.'

Our Primate, the Most Reverend Fred Hiltz will be retiring as the Primate of the Anglican Church of Canada at the end of General Synod scheduled to meet July 10-16, 2019. We give thanks to God for Fred's exemplary and faithful leadership as our Primate for twelve years and we pray for God richest blessings on him and Lyn in their years of retirement. I also call on all our parishes, clergy and laity, to pray for the General Synod as it will be electing a new Primate. The House of Bishops will nominate candidates for the primacy, and the clergy and laity will elect a bishop who will be our next Primate.

The 42nd General Synod meeting whose theme is, "I Have Called You By Name (Isaiah 43:1) July 10-16, 2019 will meet in the Diocese of New Westminster. The Synod's agenda will include a motion on a Self-determining Indigenous Church in the Anglican Church of Canada and the second reading of the Marriage Canon XX1 Motion to change the Canon.

I continue to be very disturbed by the ongoing level of violence taking place in some of our communities. In the first two weeks of this year there were four murders. Those are four murders too many. I continue to invite your prayers for those in law enforcement and the judiciary that they will act justly and with social partners in finding ways to reduce, if not eliminate such violence. We are a people of faith, hope and confidence in a loving, gracious and merciful God. Our roles as Christians are to continue bearing witness to that love, hope, graciousness and mercy offered us by Almighty God every day. We must continue the missional work that is before us, in building communities of compassion and hope.

During the up-coming Lenten season I will be leading a 'reflection series' in each of the York Simcoe Deaneries. I am very much looking forward to sharing reflections with the clergy and laity in the deaneries on the theme, 'Give us this day our daily bread'. I hope that many of you will join me in a discipline of reflection during lent. The dates are March 13, 20, April 3 and 10. Locations will be sent to your parishes shortly.

The Area Council continues it's work in providing funding for wonderful and meaningful ministries taking place across our Episcopal area of York Simcoe. We are blessed with faithful lay and ordained persons who tirelessly give of themselves week by week and year by year.

The College of Bishops is ever grateful for the faithful ministry carried out in our Diocese by dedicated clergy who give so much of themselves in serving the people entrusted to their pastoral care and responsibility. We are equally indebted to retired clergy who serve either in interim ministries or as priest-in-charge. I thank the Rev. Carol Hardie for her dedicated ministry as she retired in June of last year. We wish her every blessing in retirement.

There continues to be conversations in the media and in our diocese about Medical Assistance in Dying. The Episcopal areas of Trent Durham and York Credit Valley have held forums in providing opportunities for clergy and laity to engage in such conversations ably led by the Rev. Dr. Eric Beresford and Mr. Michael Buttrey. We are in conversation with Eric and Michael to also have similar forums in York

Simcoe in mid to late winter or early spring. We will advise parishes when and where these will take place.

We welcome to our area the Reverend Dr. Gregory Gilson as Incumbent of St. Peter, Churchill and St. John, Cookstown; The Rev. Karen Hatch will begin as the new incumbent of Trinity Church, Aurora on April 1, 2019. We wish Greg and Karen and their parishes every blessing in these new ministries. I ask your ongoing prayers for Nancy Hannah who is serving as our new area Youth Coordinator succeeding the Rev. Brian Suggs.

We offer our prayers and good wishes to the Rev. Jason Prisley who has been appointed as the new Incumbent of St. Hugh & St. Edmund. Jason has been in the parish of Christ Church, Stouffville for 11 years as Assistant Curate and Incumbent. The Rev. Brian Suggs, our former area Youth Coordinator will be ordained priest on February 10, 2019 at All Saints, Kingsway as he continues his curacy there. Your prayers are asked for him.

I am indebted to the Regional Deans, the area Liturgical officers and our Administrative Assistant for their dedicated and ongoing support of my ministry as your bishop of York Simcoe.

We bade farewell to the Reverend Don French and thank Almighty God for his life, work and witness. May he rest in peace and rise with Christ in glory.

May God bless you richly in 2019 and equip you in the work to which he has called you.

Wardens' Report

The wardens' report is an opportunity to review the events of the past year and once more we have completed a successful and rewarding year at St. Mary's.

This past year saw the completion of the eaves trough work and the repair of the flat roof in the Arnold Wing as well as the sloping of additional flat roof areas to prevent leakages that were discovered. The wardens thank all the members and groups in the congregation who made specific donations to this project which helped to reduce the amount that had to be withdrawn from the Heritage Fund. You will find exact details of the funding of this project elsewhere in this vestry package. We do thank Chas Mills and Colin Webb, our "property guys" for all the work they do around the extensive buildings which form our church.

We were fortunate this year to have been the recipient of two grants. One was from the government which allowed us to hire a summer student, Isha Patel whose duties were shared with Home on the Hill. Isha began the process of updating the church's web site, a work that is still in progress. The other was a grant from the diocese. On Dec. 2nd during his annual visit to the parish, Bishop Fenty announced that we had been awarded a grant of \$133,000 over a three period for the hiring of an additional staff member who will oversee the Family Ministry initiative with the additional duty of completion of and administering of the web site. The Family Ministry Team will be meeting soon to begin the process which will lead to the interviewing and hiring of this new staff position.

The wardens and the Rector are charged with the task of the responsible management of the parish's financial resources. Despite the usual slump in attendance during the summer months, we have ended 2018 with an operating surplus. We thank all of you for your generosity through your contributions via the weekly envelopes and the preauthorized giving program.

There are so many in the church who volunteer so much of their time and talent in order to be able to carry out our Mission Statement and we extend our deepest gratitude to all who serve on our committees and especially to the chair persons of each committee who are also members of the Parish Board. It is evident from the numerous reports found elsewhere in this package, how much we do within our church community and the broader one by means of our Outreach programs. There are many other opportunities, especially during our Sunday morning services, where assistance is needed. We are in need of intercessors, chalice administrators and altar guild members to name a few.

A special recognition goes once again to Karl Lashley and all his volunteers who organized two very successful fundraising dinners this year, one in February and another in October. These are very important events not only for the funds they raise but also for the opportunity they give for fellowship. We offer our gratitude to the members of the ACW for their efforts in organising the very successful annual bazaar in November and to Diane Robertson and her team who prepare and organise the Parish Lunch which occurs on the first Wednesday of each month from September to June.

The wardens would like to thank the Rev. Matthew McMIllan for his support of the Wardens and for all his work in every aspect of St. Mary's; Betty Lehming, our Office Administrator, who assists in so many ways; Betty Romanchuk, our Space Usage Chairperson; Maggie Veltheer, our Treasurer; Lucy Quintero, the Envelope Secretary and John Martin, deputy Envelope Secretary; Soyoung Shin, our Music Director and Organist and John Macey, our caretaker for their dedication to St. Mary's in all they do.

Two of our wardens will not be continuing their roles into 2019. We talk about what things are taking place at the church itself, and we deliver bulletins and the Anglican newspaper and/or booklets of "Day by Day" or "Our Daily Bread." This is also a "listening ministry" as some folks just wish to talk to someone regarding their personal and special concerns.

We have meetings quite often on the 4th Sunday of the month with Father Matt to discuss the progress and/or the lack of progress and our concerns regarding those who have been recently visited. Needless to say, all these visits and discussions are held in the strictest of confidence.

Anointing Ministry

The church's healing ministry represents the continuation of Jesus' earthly ministry and in its fullest sense, seeks a reconciliation of the individual to God. Our Lord invites the church to be part of the healing ministry. It is one of the

greatest opportunities the church has today for sharing the gospel.

There are a few members of our church who have responded to the call to the ministry of anointing. They are Jan Mills, Elizabeth Lane, Rhelda Stockall, Sharon Hanns, John Emmanuel and Joe McEwen. We have all taken part in an initial training session which takes place over a three day period of time, usually at the convent of the Sisters of St. John the Divine, occurring once a year with refresher sessions every three years. The refresher course took place in October 2018. This year the training course takes place in May.

Those completing the training session, are interviewed by the Bishop. After that, a licence is issued to them enabling them to perform the ministry of anointing. We are under the direct supervision of the incumbent. At St. Mary's, anointing takes place on the first Sunday of each month. Directly after receiving communion, a communicant may proceed to two stations in order to receive anointing. Most of the anointers are also lay pastoral visitors and this affords another occasion when anointing may take place, in a private home, nursing home or hospital.

At the Chrism Mass and Blessing of the Oils service, which takes place on the Tuesday of Holy Week each year, the blessed oil is brought back to the churches. There are two types of oil that are used for different purposes. Chrism oil, which is scented, is used at baptisms and Unction oil which is unscented, is the oil which the anointers use at the service of healing.

I feel very blessed to have been called to this servant ministry as do all of our anointers. This ministry is given to the church as a community of believers.

Family Ministry Report

Over the past few years St. Mary's has continued to have a vision for our identity as a parish church. We want to be a place that serves our community, while helping individuals and families grow in their walk with God. Our efforts to further this aim has come to fruition in our long-range Family

Ministry Plan. In the Fall of 2018 the Diocesan Grant Review Committee approved a 3 year supportive funding grant for St. Mary's. The Diocese approved our 'Staffing for Growth' application for funding from the Our Faith Our Hope campaign. St. Mary's has been awarded \$130,000 over 3 years to help fund our new staffing position at the church. Because of the funds that have been already raised by the parish, and our willingness to commit to a plan to grow our givings, to work towards being able to self-fund this position after the 3 year grant is over, we will soon be adding a Family Ministry Staff Member to our team! Our new position will be called, 'The Director of Family Ministries' and this full-time staff member will have a variety of responsibilities too that will help to grow our church family. This position will involve supporting and resourcing our programs for our Youth, as well as helping to create program options for Young Families, Singles, Couples and broader items for our whole parish family. During March and April 2019 we will be posting out position as open and receiving applications, and we will look to complete our hiring process just after Easter. We look forward to introducing our new team member over the last 2 months of Sunday School to our Youth before the summer starts. And as the summer unfolds, this individual will be able to root themselves within the fabric of St. Mary's, to be ready to hit the ground running in the Fall. We ask that the parish keep this ministry in your prayers as we move into a time of discernment and new beginnings. May this new step for our church bless our community and bring honour to God's Holy Name!

Lay Synod Delegates' Report

St. Mary's Synod Delegates:

Clergy: Fr. Matthew Macmillan Lay delegates: Joe McEwen; Monica Woodley

Synod in 2018 was particularly active, engaging and energized. The 157^{th} Synod of November 2017 set the stage for the flow of events and activities of 2018.

These included the introduction and continuous work on the Diocese's four year Strategic Plan "Growing in Christ"; the announcement of Archbishop Colin Johnson's retirement in December 2018; the prior process and election of Bishop Johnson's successor – a coadjutor Bishop; "Missional Moments" encouraging clergy and laity to think in new and different ways of church planting and outreach living out the Gospel of Jesus in love and service in the world; heated conversations and reports on same sex marriage & changes to the Marriage Canon.

All coming together at the Diocese of Toronto's 158th Regular Session of Synod held on November 9-10, 2018 at the Sheraton Parkway Hotel in Richmond Hill. Extensive information on Synod can be found at www.toronto.anglican.ca/. We encourage parishioners to visit this Diocesan site.

One of the significant early events of 2018 was heralded with the announcement:

"Synod members in the Diocese of Toronto are called to assemble at St. James Cathedral, 65 Church Street, Toronto, at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, June 9, 2018 to elect a Coadjutor Bishop. The Rt. Rev. John H. Chapman, Bishop of Ottawa, will preside at the Synod."

With this Call came a series of information and video clips about the candidates; about the responsibilities and gifts required for the ministry of the Diocesan Bishop of Toronto; and the election process.

At St. Mary's RH, on June 1st, Fr. Matthew arranged an informal, very informative, prayerful session with the two Lay Delegates reviewing the material on the candidates allowing us some thoughtful reflection on the weighty task of electing the Coadjutor Bishop who would eventually replace Bishop Colin Johnson.

On June 9, 2018 an Electoral Synod was convened at St. James Cathedral, Toronto. Amidst great excitement and anticipation, Dean Andrew Asbil was elected the Coadjutor Bishop who would work with and eventually succeed Bishop Colin Johnson as the Bishop of Toronto. We continue to keep them both in prayers, as Archbishop Johnson retired on December 31, 2018.

On Sept 9, 2018, along with Fr. Matthew we attended the joyful Celebration of Bishop Andrew Asbil's Consecration at the Cathedral.

Diocesan Synod on November 23-24, 2018 was the final enriching gathering for the year.

Highlights, along with Missional Moments by various Churches, included frequent Table Conversations on the proposed Marriage Canon Changes. From these "conversations" a consolidated comprehensive Report was put together by both Bishops to be sent to General Synod. The final Vote on the issue is to be held at the June 2019 General Synod.

In addition we received inspired Reflections on his 41 Years of Ministry by the outgoing Bishop Johnson, and a challenging Charge to Synod by the incoming Bishop Andrew Asbil.

Bishop Asbil's words were poignantly memorable. If St. Mary's Parishioners have not read it, we encourage you to read the entire delivery in the January 2019 "The Anglican" newspaper – "We are in a Moment in Between".

Much of this address may speak to our life here at St. Mary's RH. Thus we'll pull out a few bits where Bishop Asbil begins "I'd like to share just four things about what I have been

hearing and listening to and watching" in his new journey of preparation. He weaves his thoughts within the Biblical Story of the four friends who lower a paralytic through a roof in a house where Jesus is speaking and healing.

The four things:

- 1. To see Jesus. To experience the Risen Lord in our midst.
- 2. We need each other. Imagine the 4 friends. "It was their tenacity, their faith, their hunger to push through so that their friend might be healed".
- 3. Creation matters. "The UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) has given us sobering news. We would throw it all out at our peril.... The Church needs not to be passive now but active, because creation matters.....for this generation, our grandchildren's generation and our great grandchildren's generation..."

There's a hole in my roof. Here he speaks of holes in our structures – physical as in our buildings. Are these burdens or opportunities? Holes in our cultural structures that divide and keep out. Do we have the courage to change and transform

Bishop Asbil ends by saying he is a bit nervous to take the training wheels off as he takes on the new mantle, but he is excited with "a new sense of a dawning day, of new creative ways that we will meet the future. Don't be afraid. Pedal along. Thanks be to God."

Property Committee

The property team, Charlie Mills and myself (aka The Property Brothers) take care of ongoing maintenance such as painting, plumbing, and repairs. We also assist in securing contractors for larger jobs. Its been a hectic year for property at St. Mary's. Here are some of the highlights:

The flat roof over the Arnold cemetery area was rebuilt with a sloped roof. Other areas of the flat roof around the sanctuary have been either sloped or repaired. Sloping of the flat roof allows the water to run off the roof and not pool.

The eaves trough work on Wrixon Hall that was started in 2017 was finished. Wrixon Hall also had a facelift when the columns on the south side of the building were clad in aluminum.

The eaves trough on the south side of the church was replaced along with the soffit and fascia.

Water leaking was a problem in the Chapel furnace room. The flat roof was resealed, the furnace room walls were parged, drainage was improved and the sump pump was replaced.

All the eaves troughs on the church buildings that are close to trees have had leaf guard's installed. This also includes the rectory. This will save money over time by not having the expense of cleaning the eaves trough every year.

An arborist was hired to trim the tree branches overhanging the west wing buildings.

The light standards and fixtures along Mclatchy Lane were replaced at the expense of Discovery due to an auto accident that they were responsible for.

St. Mary's at Mackenzie Health

The service is held in the Long Term Care wing, located on the 4th floor of the A wing of the hospital. Over the years we see many regular attendees, we also see new faces.

Most of the patients arrive in wheelchairs. Young hospital volunteers assist in helping to move these folk into the room in which the service takes place.

We have a set service and use hymns from "Hymns We Love to Sing," which is a booklet of collected favourite hymns. Chas accompanies us on the piano.

The St. Mary's visiting team consists of: John Emmanuel, Jan and Chas Mills, Joe McEwen and Jenny and Bruce Rogers.

Each one of us contributes in different ways, ie. Reading gospel, leading prayers etc. and Joe always delivers an inspiring Homily.

John and Joe remain after the main service to offer communion to those desiring same.

There are on an average 23 residents attending; the most being 34 and the least in number being 15. There are usually 3 hospital youth volunteers also in attendance.

Most summers Chas and Jan are away during July and August and Jenny, Bruce, John and Joe carry on with the service during July and August. All receive grace and love during these gatherings.

As always, many in this small congregation close their eyes and listen to the familiar words, some fall asleep, some are restless.

This is indeed always a very fulfilling ministry and we are glad to have the privilege to be a part of this very worthwhile ministry.

Outreach & Social Advocacy Committee

This committee met once a month during the spring and fall of 2018, with members Dionne Robertson, Norman McMullen, Maggie Veltheer, Lyne Webb. Towards the end of the year, we welcomed Julie Hastie to the committee. We acknowledge, Gwen Halliday, as an Honorary Member of this Committee for her long-time service.

As in past years, St. Mary's hosted the Out of the Cold program, on consecutive Mondays, for ten weeks, from the end of January to the end of March. Many thanks to the parishioners who volunteered their time once again to this cause and to those who donated baked goods each week. We are fortunate to have a dedicated group of volunteers from the community as well as the congregation to allow us to provide much needed hospitality during the coldest months of the year to those who are in need of a hot meal, warm bed, breakfast and a packed lunch.

At our 2018 Vestry, St. Mary's supported the Diocese of Toronto's motion on Affordable Housing and Homelessness.

Our committee held a workshop to inform parishioners on the motion and encouraged a letter writing campaign to local, provincial and federal government leaders with regard to homelessness.

With the help of our 'bakers' (Catherine Goodman, Karen Ferrie, Paulette Popp & committee members) and 'buyers' of Loonie Muffins and Fair Trade Coffee & Chocolate, we are able to continue to support two foster children through Plan Canada. Oscar from El Salvador has graduated from school and Plan Canada. We now support Nelson-Bladimir, also of El Salvador as well Sakshi in India. It costs approximately \$1000.00/year to sponsor these two children and we are grateful for the congregation's continued support through our coffee hour sales.

In an attempt to further our knowledge of the Truth & Reconciliation Process, our committee hosted a KAIROS facilitated Blanket Exercise, which we opened to the parish and also the greater community. We had twenty-five participants and did manage to attract attendance from outside our church family. The attendees were engaged in the exercise and gained an added awareness and appreciation for the treatment of Canada's Indigenous people from the arrival of Europeans to Canada's shores to present date.

This committee continues to encourage food donations for the Richmond Hill Community Food Bank. The food bank has seen a sharp increase in new users since November. Additionally, we used money from the Merchant Card Sale Program to purchase food items which we assembled into complete meal packages to have on hand for those in need who come into the church from the community. They are able to take one of these packages over to the Krasman Centre (drop-in centre on Yonge St. in the middle of town) and use their facility to heat and eat their meal. When the shelves were bare at the foodbank in November we were able to donate \$100.00 in Loblaw gift cards, to help alleviate the situation.

Our annual Christmas Adopt-A-Family program was changed this year. We still asked our congregation for donations, however, rather that distributing the money ourselves to those who contact the church directly, we instead partnered with the Salvation Army, who distributed the (75) \$20.00 Loblaw and (75) \$20.00 Wal-Mart gift cards that we were

able to purchase through the Merchant Card Program. Purchasing the \$3000.00 worth of cards through the Merchant Card program enabled us to purchase \$300.00 worth of additional gift cards for Outreach to use for those in need who approach the church directly.

The committee would like to thank Ron Smit, an ad-hoc committee member, for his promotion and administration of the Merchant Card Program. Thanks also to parishioners who support this program. With some forethought on the part of the congregation and Ron's administration of the program, St. Mary's is able to raise money to purchase gift cards to aid those in need in the Richmond Hill community.

We are open to new members to our committee and are always looking for ways to lend our support or our voice to social justice issues. If you would like to join the committee or see a need for advocacy locally or the wider community, please approach a committee member. We thank the Parish for your continuing support of our endeavours.

The Archives Committee

I am pleased to report that we have had a busy and productive year and I am deeply grateful to our Committee members Joan Connolly, Lucia Ferrara, Dave Hunt, Lucille King, Phil Shepherd and Colin Webb. It was a pleasure to welcome Lucia to our Committee in April, while at the end of the year we were sorry to say goodbye to Phil Shepherd, who has moved to Elora. I want to add my personal appreciation to Lucille who serves as our Secretary so efficiently and conscientiously. Each Committee member has contributed to the Committee faithfully over the year. We strive to meet on a monthly basis throughout the year and despite the limitations and "wheel-spinning" that we may occasionally encounter, it is safe to say that our meetings are always enjoyable. After our opening prayer, tea and great refreshments are served. All three are essentials!

St. Mary's is part of the heritage community in Richmond Hill and as a reflection of that, we received several inquiries from beyond the Parish this year. As in the past, memberships have been renewed with The National Trust for Canada (Heritage Canada), The Ontario Heritage Trust and The Richmond Hill Historical Society.

On February 28th, a small display in honour of National Heritage Week was shared following both services. We were pleased to exhibit three unique photographs of the former rectory, kindly donated by Canon James O'Neil. They are excellent images of that building and we were happy to receive this donation. As a take-away, an order-of-service from the "Opening, Dedication and Inspection of St. Mary's Rectory, Richmond Hill, Sunday, May 27th, 1951" was reproduced and distributed to interested parishioners.

We are deeply grateful for the many donations received this year. Diane Robertson has generously donated the complete file of Minutes, financial statements, etc. from her work as Chair of the former Chapel Restoration Committee. This is a significant addition to our collection. In addition we have received a large box of notepaper designed by the famous Canadian artist, Glen Loates. It seems he attended a Christmas Bazaar in the early 1980's and subsequently made this gift to the Parish. I should add that Gwen Halliday has donated a large quantity of very interesting material related to the Property Committee as well as fascinating papers from the estate of the late Rev. Fred Jackson. Jenny and Bruce Rogers have also kindly shared numerous items including back issues of The Message, orders-of-service and wonderful files relating to various social events that have taken place at St. Mary's over the years. Many thanks as well to Joan Connolly for donating historic orders-of-service, older photographs and significant newspaper clippings. So our collection continues to grow!

In April we arranged our much anticipated visit with the Sunday School. We shared information about our historic Chapel bell and offered a hands-on ringing extravaganza after the 10:30 service. We were pleased to welcome several children from St. Seraphim's Russian Orthodox congregation who joined in the ringing festivities. As you may already know, this bell is a very important part of our history, harkening back to the time when Anglicans in Richmond Hill held their services across the street in Dr. Duncombe's Hall. Many thanks to Lauren Wirtzfeld and all the teachers for helping us to arrange this direct connection between The Archives and Sunday School.

We arranged the updating of the service plaque given to Murray Baer, marking his 25th anniversary as Organist and Choirmaster at St. Mary's. This plaque now correctly reflects Murray's 33 years of faithful ministry to our Parish.

Doors Open was a success again this year and our Committee was pleased to facilitate that event. While the number of visitors was down slightly, Heritage Services staff felt that quality of visits was good and that guests tended to ask more questions and shared their own information. This was certainly the case at St. Mary's. We were greatly encouraged by the number of parishioners who volunteered for the event – some for the entire day. The Green Team provided a splendid display related to urgent environmental concerns. Many visitors spent considerable time exploring and discussing the various exhibits. Thank you Green Team! And who could forget the beautiful banner that was made by our amazing Sunday School children? We were so pleased to have them on board for Doors Open, 2018 and plan to share their artistry again in the future.

The wrap-up meeting for Doors Open, 2018 was held at the David Dunlap Observatory. Following the meeting, we were given a tour of the buildings. Private tours of the Observatory will be offered this summer, making me think that this could be a very interesting community outreach event for parishioners. Please let me know if you are interested in touring the Observatory. Thanks to Lucille King, Joan Connolly and Phil Shepherd for joining me at this important meeting for all participating sites.

Sunday, November 11th marked the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I. In honour of this event and as a peacemaking initiative, The Royal Canadian Legion asked all churches across Canada to ring their bells 100 times at sunset and to include a time of reflection and prayer. Fr. Matthew organized a beautiful service of remembrance in the Chapel and the bell was indeed rung at least 100 times! All fifty two attendees were offered the opportunity to ring the bell. Following these observances, the Royal Canadian Legion, Branch 375, hosted a delicious supper for all participants. We enjoyed their gracious hospitality and had the opportunity to meet members from Our Lady Queen of the World Roman Catholic Church, St. Matthew's United Church and of course those from the Legion Branch itself. At the conclusion of the evening, the Legion's President presented us with a beautiful

plaque, commemorating our involvement in Bells of Peace. It was a great community event and I was so pleased that St. Mary's was well represented.

The Committee is delighted that we have been given use of the bulletin boards opposite the Arnold Plot. This is another element in our own Arnold Plot Revitalization Initiative [APRI] that has been under discussion for considerable time. We are making some final decisions about this somewhat lengthy process and hope to have our first display in place in February.

Our Committee is working hard at organizing a "Fragments Evening" as we revisit the 1960's and the very popular coffee house that flourished in the basement of the Chapel at that time. Again, we thank all who have donated items to our growing collection. The A.C.W. kindly supported us again this year with another generous grant. We greatly appreciate your financial support as well as your encouragement and interest and we thank you for allowing us to be part of the Christmas Bazaar once again this year. Even though our sales may not be large, we believe that this is an interesting way for us to establish contacts with the community.

Finally, I want to express my gratitude to Betty Lehming for steering me along in the right direction from time to time. And of course many thanks to Fr. Matthew, whose enthusiastic support of our Committee is so refreshing. It has been a pleasure to work with you as our Committee strives to preserve and share our Parish's rich heritage.

Sunday School

It has been another busy year for Sunday School! We run Sunday School each week during the 10:30 am service, with the exception of the 3rd Sunday of the month where we have a family service. We have an average of 12 children attending each week with our busiest week being 19 children. We are currently running three classes, our JK to grade 3 class, grade 4+ class and most recently Pam McMillan has started a preschool class. For our school aged children we continue to use curriculum from SparkHouse as the base with changes in the Sunday School format depending on larger projects we are working on.

We currently have three teachers for our younger (Junior Kindergarten to grade 3) class: Erika Golden, Julie Gibbons and Natasha Daisley; two teachers for our older class (grade 4+): myself and Eric Kupka; and two teachers for the preschool class: Pam McMillan and Lucy Amankwah. We are supported by the two Sunday School helpers who provide an extra set of hands to run the lesson for the younger class: Mona Wilson, and Lucia Ferrara. A special thank you to Julie Gibbons who has continued to lead and share her nature devotionals with our Sunday School program despite moving away.

There are a number of other activities Sunday School is involved in. Natasha Daisley continues to send out birthday cards to the children from Sunday School, we've heard good feedback on the children enjoying getting a special note from their friends at St. Mary's. Over the summer, when we didn't have our regular lessons, we again made activity packs available for the children to take into church and had a couple of Sundays where we had casual activities in the Sunday School room. We had a special guest-lesson led by the Archives committee in honour of Heritage Week where we talked about the history of the bell in the Chapel and the children all had a chance to ring the bell after the church service. The children also contributed a large cross banner to the display of crosses at Doors Open this year.

The Sunday School put on a nativity pageant during the family service in December. Thank you to Pam McMillan for her leadership in this endeavour and to Keely Gervais for the AV assistance. A humorous and well written play was selected that is designed to be able to put together in a short period of time. The children very much enjoyed working on this presentation to share. We had 19 children participate in the pageant.

Instead of trying to time our outreach activities with the Christmas season this year, we decided to start working on some projects in January-February. The children are currently collecting toiletries to make hygiene bags for Out Of The Cold. As of February 3rd, we've made up about 70 bags. The children have spent time discussing the needs in our community and our world and how they are able to spread Christ's love. Some of the children have worked on small cards we've copied to put in the hygiene bags to spread some love.

The second project they are working on is collecting books and change in order to send books to schools in Nunavut. We discussed how we are blessed living somewhere where we have access to our books at home, in our classroom, school libraries and public libraries. Also, how there is a bit disparity in how different communities live, even within our own country. We are working with the Outreach and Social Justice Committee on this endeavour as it will cost to get the books shipped to the different schools.

Our main challenge is the very limited number of teachers we have for Sunday School. The number of children continues to grow and we now have three classes to make sure we are addressing the needs of the different age groups, however, with such a limited number of teachers we are having to combine classes fairly regularly.

Green Team

The Team continued its general practice of meeting on the last Wednesday of every month with an additional meeting when necessary.

At the February meeting we were fortunate to have Harry French of the Windfall Ecology Centre and Manager of the Climate Wise Business Network on his involvement with Faith and the Common Good. This could help us in furthering the "greening of our Church" - a topic on our drawing board for some time. Holy Trinity Anglican Thornhill has achieved this already. There is some financial assistance available from the Trillium Foundation. Some progress has been made now on this during 2018 on the energy benchmarking part which involved analysis of the Church's energy use over the past three years. The Property Committee is now involved in the next stage of assessing what environmental upgrades would be needed on the Church buildings.

At the beginning of the year we were also focusing on planning for "a Green Lent" and finding ways to involve the congregation. For example, rather than people giving up something comparatively frivolous like chocolate, we pointed out in Church announcements that it was possible to be more mindful of the environment and make an effort to do things that were in small ways helpful such as remembering to use re-usable types of bags when shopping to cut down on plastics.

The Green Team performed a brief "skit" for the congregation as a pre-Lent start-up focus entitled Give It Up For The Earth.

Fr. Matthew initiated a fund raiser to pay for solar light-bulbs to help those in the Caribbean Islands who had suffered from the effects of the hurricanes including 'Maria' one of which was loss of electrical power. This was a successful Lenten project resulting in \$1342 that was sent to the diocese of NECA (North Eastern Caribbean and Aruba).

During Lent we also arranged for Steve Lee, Founding Executive Director of FES (Foundation for Environmental Stewardship) to address the congregation in place of the Sermon on March 11th. Steve has made remarkable progress in his plan to travel forth and back addressing high school students on all aspects of climate change and the taking of responsibility to reduce its harmful effects greenhouse gas emissions. Steve continues with this vital work which requires ongoing funding: contributions can be made to this charitable organization at: www.FESplanet.org.

In June, which was also the 10th anniversary of the Green Team, we commenced with a presentation from two staff of the TRCA (Toronto and Region Conservation Authority) on the Lake St. George Field Centre's educational environmental programmes. (Located not far from Lake Wilcox). Predominantly aimed at children and teenagers of school age, there are also some activities for adults. It is hoped that we can organize an information session on this for the congregation during 2019.

Communication Committee Report

We are engaging in policies and projects to enhance communication throughout the church property.

This summer and fall we went ahead with the exterior signage project. All the tenant signs were removed from the entrance to McLatchy Lane and an improved St. Mary's sign installed. The new sign included our Yonge St. address and was elevated to be more noticeable.

Along the McLatchy Lane parking signs were installed to designate St. Mary's and Discovery parking spaces.

On the south west corner of Wrixon Hall a large sign was erected to display the names of our tenants with an arrow indicating which door to use. In the future a light will be installed to better illuminate the sign at night.

Vinyl signs were installed on the windows over the main entrance. These signs display the names of St. Seraphim's and the Blessed Community churches with St. Mary's in the middle.

Thanks to all the committee members for their hard work. We would also like to thank Laura Lehming (*Coordinator of Design and Wayfinding@ TTC*) for her design work and advice on the signage project at St. Mary's.

Home on the Hill Supportive Housing

It has been a good year for the introduction of a "Friday Lunch" cooked with the assistance of our life coach and participants of Home on the Hill. We partnered with the Dementia church so that its members would have lunch and then go into the chapel for a hymn sing. Krasman Centre has sent guests, community groups such as Community Living have come and anyone in the church and wider community were invited for the community meal. We plan to pick this program up again in March after a break.

We have a peer support group for people with a mental illness that meets and just chills or plays bongo drums or does art. It is an opportunity to socialize and have a bit of fun. Our art therapist/psychotherapist runs this program.

We continue to have our parent support group in the narthex on alternate Wednesdays. This is an opportunity for family caregivers to vent and share advice and stories with other parents on a similar journey. We plan respite activities periodically for an evening away to enjoy some recreational time away from their responsibilities.

We still support a person with a mental illness to be able to live in The Hub apartment. We are beginning our 3 year of support and it has been working well.

The ACW has been a wonderful support with a grant of \$1,000 so that we can afford to do these activities. The church itself, has been very generous with its contribution of free space. We deeply appreciate the generosity of so many!





Motions for 2019 Vestry Meeting

Approval of Auditors Motion: (*This motion allows us to formally appoint our auditor's for next years reports*)

"We the Vestry of St. Mary's, Richmond Hill authorize the appointment of Hurren, Sinclair, McIntyre,
Chartered Accounts of Pickering Ontario, to be the Auditors of record for St. Mary's Financial
Reports for the year ending 2019 Financial Cycle."

Rectory Grant Motion: (This motion gives us permission to apply for Diocesan Grants for work on The Rectory if any major or urgent repairs are required. No such work is anticipated, but voting on this now means that no special vestry will be required if such an application is needed.)

"We the Vestry of St. Mary's, Richmond Hill authorize the Corporation to apply for a Carleton Grant, to help pay for costs of maintenance, renovation and repair to our Parish Rectory, located at 100 Arnold Crescent in Richmond Hill."

Visioning/Building Review Motion: Private Paper Ballot

(This motion will be a private paper ballot, held towards the start of our Vestry Meeting. This vote is being held for the congregation of St. Mary's to help discern which option should be fully reviewed and then presented back to the congregation for further ratification or rejection. Vestry members will be asked to select their preferred first option, for a draft plan to be created. As formal discussions and consultations have been held prior to Vestry, no formal debate will be held on the motion. Questions of clarification or amendments will be in order if needed.

"We the Vestry of St. Mary's, Richmond Hill authorize the Corporation to move forward with a formal review of the following option, for St. Mary's Visioning and Building Review."

(Members will select from the following options)

- A. Fundraising Study to see if we can raise \$1,000,000 over 10 years.
- B. Sales Study to review selling surplus land on Yonge Street between the Main Church and the 2 houses to the South.
- C. Redevelopment Study to see what possible options exist to partner with developers and develop on our property or sell buildings/land to develop ourselves.
- D. Write In Proposals Additional proposals are welcome as they come forward.
- E. Rectory Relocating Study to review whether we should divest/sell the current property on Arnold Crescent, relocating our clergy and their family to a cheaper part of town and seeing what proceeds can be realized.

Building / Engineering Review Motion: Private Paper Ballot

(In 2020 St. Mary's will be required to do an Engineering Review of our Buildings. If the parish votes in favour of option "B" this engineering review will be needed in 2019 to help with the Diocesan Process Needed for this option. If option "B" is approved, the Wardens will be asking the congregation to give guidance on how to fund this cost. Should it be funded completely by the Heritage Fund {the balance is \$30,000} or from a variety of sources. If you vote in favour, you would be comfortable with all the expenses being covered by the Heritage Fund. If you vote against, you would be directing the Wardens to find a variety of budget lines to draw from to pay this expense. Our estimated costs are between \$15,000 - \$19,000 and this cost is mandated to be done by the Diocese every 10 years.

"We the Vestry of St. Mary's, Richmond Hill recommend the Corporation proceed with an Engineering Survey and Environmental Audit of our buildings and further recommend the cost be taken from the Heritage Fund."
